

Millions of public dollars were spent to buy these ranches for the public's seashore and millions more are being spent to subsidize the ranches — some of which operate on an industrial scale — at a time when the park service is seriously understaffed and park maintenance budgets are cut. Now, in addition to their cows, ranchers are pressing the park service to allow them to raise commercial chickens, rabbits and sheep. These are sure to attract native predators like foxes, badgers, bobcats and covotes. What then?

When you visit the national seashore take a look at the land — our land. It might lead you to wonder what, and who, is this national park for?
